# MURDER!! IN YOUR FAMILY TREE By Randy Ray

- Randy knows firsthand what it looks like to run across a murder in the family. Not 1, not 2, but 13 at this point.
- He will cover what to do when you find a murder in your tree, and how to figure out if it actually was a murder. It is not always clear cut.
- Suggestions for various records that may help you with your discoveries and the importance of newspapers in research such as this.
- Various methods, which records to follow and how to document them will be discussed including using some special tools in Family Tree Maker 2024.

# MORE MURDER!! IN THE FAMILY TREE By Debbie Bluett

- Debbie takes you on a journey highlighting a double murder that took place in 1879 in Minnesota, along with the aftermath.
- Henry Kolway and Frank Steinhuber were murdered, and their bodies were hidden.
- She will cover the research needed over four decades of changing techniques that uncovered the details and family connections in the small community almost 150 years ago.

## RESEARCHING CLERGY IN YOUR FAMILY TREE By Linda Murphy

- Linda shared some of the sources to try and connect when you may know of a clergy person in your family tree
- She knew there were definitely two members of Clergy in her tree but it proved to bear several more.
- Fully utilizing obituary information is different in people of calling
  - Standard survivor information
  - Service timeline
  - Retirement bliss
- She shared how it is more than just factual confirmations – it often lends itself to filling in the story of who they were and the impact they made.
- Places to check:
  - Diocesan Offices
  - Parish records and directories
  - Obituaries very thorough including family and schooling right next to places served and retired often.
- Utilize your standard tools such as Find-A-Grave and Family Search
  - Can find dates of ordination or profession
  - Some cemetery pics have family plot information and can help verify additional family members.
- Historical Societies and some libraries also have good resources
- Officiant records may also lead to additional connection. Many times, a registry or document may not name the Church location, but it will name the Officiant that conducted the ceremony.
- She shared cherished memories from her childhood of Great Aunt visits as Sister Baptiste. Sharing Sister Baptiste's Jubilee celebration and the joy Sister lived her life to share.

# • DEMO EDITING VIDEOS-ADD SOUND-SPLIT-JOIN By Bob Heck

- Bob taught us dozens of tips, tricks and resources available to enhance and save your videos from daysgone-by.
- These tips in the demonstration will also show ways to preserve the best parts of videos for easiest storage
  - Adding sound to videos
  - How to split videos
  - How to join videos
- Knowing how these work can allow you to digitally capture and preserve the best parts of your video collections
- Please see his handout notes for all the options he covered. Here are some of the additional items that came up in questions and helpful rabbit holes at the meeting:
- o Analog VS Digital differences
- Best ways to store pics and vids:
  - Flash drive great option
  - SSD hard drives (external)
  - Cloud be cautious on your choices for this one.3
- Have your video files in MP4 format
- Various methods to digitize old movies
- Products that are helpful such as Wolverine and VLC Media Player and places you can borrow for free.
- o MP4 tools: joiner and splitter
- Tips on compressing file using Handbrake program
- o Tool called Video Pad by NCH:
  - You must verify it is not being used for commercial use – this keeps it free.
  - They have 35 short video tutorials available. Very helpful
